
The knowledge I have gained over the past 25 years in my career, and the partnerships I have embraced, will allow me to make a real difference in 53 Division.

As a reminder, the Neighbourhood Officer is your primary contact for long term continuous complaints such as graffiti, trespassing, and panhandling. We have also been working hard at improving our division's communication strategy. You have likely noticed that our Community Bulletin has been updated and it now includes updates from most of our sub units including the Criminal Investigation Bureau and the Primary Response Unit. 

Yonge Bloor Bay Business Association Hails Chief's Walk-About!

Recently Chief Bill Blair had the chance to reacquaint himself with the residents and business community of Yorkville. Organised by the Yonge Bloor Bay Business Association (YBBA), the Chief's walk was not only intended to provide him with input and insight from the many business owners in the area, but to showcase the fine work being done by a number of organizations including the YBBA, GYRA (Greater Yorkville Residents' Association), and the Retail Council of Canada, all in partnership with local police officers who call Yorkville their "beat."

Co-Chairs Alex Stuart and Gee Chung of the YBBA's Police Liaison and Safety Committee created a 'road map' of local business locations for the Chief to explore, and to listen to issues ranging from crime and disorder, to the success of the recent TIFF celebrations.

"GYRA has a membership of 26 condo buildings, which is home to some 4,000 Torontonians." Said Gee Chung, long serving president of GYRA. "Walk-abouts are a good way to learn more about the concerns of the people who work and live in Yorkville."

Besides the business task at hand, Alex Stuart, Managing Partner of the Pilot Tavern on Cumberland Street, was also taken aback by what he saw; "what struck me most was the warmth that so many people extended to the Chief and he in turn to them. Chief Blair is much more easily recognized than I thought he might be and it is obvious that many people hold him in very high regard." Alex went on further to say; "All in all it seemed like a win-win day for both the residents, visitors and workers in Yorkville and of course our police officers."

"This is an example of a time and place in which to appreciate the impact of neighbourhood policing." Said Staff Sergeant Peter Henry, of 53 Community Response. "Each business we attended, each community member walking by, knew the names of my beat officers, there was a real sense of community here today."

Cold Weather and Starting Your Vehicle

During the colder weather, it is common for residents to go outside and start their vehicles to warm them for the commute. They then leave them unattended, while they gather their belongings for the day. Although newer vehicles are equipped with auto starters, some aftermarket units make the vehicle easy to steal. Before you start your car with an auto starter, be aware of the following information.

- Most newer model vehicles are safe to start and leave unattended, simply because the security system prevents the vehicle from being moved unless you have the key or fob.
- If you have an aftermarket unit installed, be sure that the vehicle can not be moved by trying to place the vehicle in drive after placing your foot on the brake pedal.
- Even if your vehicles have a proper, secure starter, be sure you don't leave any valuables, laptops, mobile phones, GPS unit, or money in the vehicle.
- DO NOT start your vehicle with a key and leave it unattended for any reason. Potential thieves are waiting for actions like these to make their job easier.
- If you have any concerns about the security of your starting system, or want to install a vehicle starter, contact a qualified technician to do the work for you.

Use common sense and keep yourself and your property secure.

53 Division Traffic Response Unit Update, October 2011

In September, the Toronto Police Service conducted two traffic safety campaigns. From September 6th to the 16th, a 'Back to School' campaign was conducted to remind drivers and pedestrians to share the roadways in a safe manner.

Officers were vigilant throughout the division with special attention paid to school zones and the 56 crossings where a Guard is posted.

From September 12th to the 18th, the 'Canada Road Safety Week' blitz was conducted. This campaign is directed at unsafe behaviours that motorists commit with emphasis on distracted driving.

53 Division officers also joined with other police divisions on September 21st to conduct vehicle inspections targeting unsafe commercial vehicles. Officers were joined by Toronto Municipal Licensing Inspectors and officers from the Ministry of the Environment. Commercial vehicles from taxicabs to transport trucks were inspected. At the end of the day 199 vehicle inspections were completed, 148 charges were laid, and one commercial truck driver had his driver's licence suspended for 3 days after failing a breath test.



With the fall season upon us, daylight hours are becoming less. Please take a few minutes and check the condition and cleanliness of the lighting systems and windows on your vehicle. Having a proper working lighting system not only allows you to see better, it allows other vehicles and pedestrians to see you.

Please remember to drive with caution and courtesy, the life you save may be your own!

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIVE BUREAU MISSING PERSON ALERT



On September 14, 2009, Mariam Makhniashvili, 17 years of age, went missing without a trace.

Mariam is described as female white, 5'4, 130 lbs, with dark coloured hair (dark brown) usually worn pulled back in a bun. She was last seen wearing Black stretch style pants, blue top, dark coloured jean jacket, wrist watch, grey coloured running shoes (worn looking), carrying a black backpack with a green stripe on the front pocket.

On the date of her disappearance Mariam and her brother George, left their apartment to walk to school. Their school, Forest Hill Collegiate, is a short 2 minute walk from their home. As they approached the school the two parted ways.

Mariam did not make it to school that day.

Since the disappearance, over 6000 persons who live in the area have been canvassed. Investigators have looked into and cleared several hundred tips from the public. Thousands of hours of video has been collected and viewed, all with negative results.

On October 8, 2009 investigators thought they may have a break in the case, when Mariam's backpack was located approximately 2 kilometres away from where she went missing. However, the backpack yielded no further evidence or clues as to Mariam's whereabouts.



Crime Stoppers tips still trickle into 53 Division and each tip is investigated; however no information that has been received since Mariam's disappearance has given investigators any tangible evidence or valid information.

We need the help of the public and members of the 53 Division community. There is a missing girl out there, a daughter, a sister, and she needs to be located. If you have any information please call D/Sgt Nealon, or crime stoppers to leave an anonymous tip.
